




#### INSTRUCTIONS:

Starting at bottom of pattern chain 121. Chain 3 to turn which will count as first double crochet of first row. Double crochet in 5th chain from hook. Double crochet in next 2 chains to complete bottom right solid square of row 1. Continue following pattern for first row reading pattern right to left. After completing first row, chain 3 to turn to start next row. Continue following pattern until all rows are complete. At end of row 40 fasten off.

MATERIALS :

APPROXIMATE FINISHED SIZE: 40 x 40

2-skeins (bernat pink baby coordinates 5.6 oz.) 1 1/2-skeins (simply soft 6oz.-bone)

GAUGE Size: H-crochet hook

Note: Use the option for changing color that suits your taste. Preferred is the option of running color throughout pattern. If using this option be sure to pull the excess color after each color change.

#### HOW TO CHANGE YARN COLOR:

To change color, work the first 2 loops of the last double crochet before new color, drop old color, hook new color and draw through last 2 loops on hook. Cut old color and work over ends of both colors. When working small color area, instead of cutting pink thread, carry pink through to next color change by working over pink with brown thread.

Tip: To keep yarn from tangling keep one color on backside of work and one on working side of work, pulling the color your working with towards the side its on. (if pink is on working side and bone on backside, when changing form pink to bone pull pink towards working side. and vs. versa.)

## HOW TO READ PATTERN:

Each solid square is equal to 4 double crochets. Each open square is equal to 1 double crochet, followed by 2 chains, followed by 1 double crochet. The double crochet at the end of each square also counts as the first double crochet of the next square. For example, a solid square followed by an open square is 4 double crochets, 2 chains, 1 double crochet. See diagrams below:

Where "

" is the symbol for one double crochet, "○" is the symbol for one chain, and "×" is the symbol for one single crochet.

When Complete Single crochet around entire outside of work with three in the corners for turning or add a nice edging. This will cover the turning color on edges.
